

INTRODUCTION

The Human Rights Arts & Film Festival (HRAFF) was founded in 2007 to make human rights relevant, accessible and engaging to all Australians. Since our inception, we have showcased over 479 films, 470 speakers, 271 artists, musicians and performers, and shared inspiring stories with over 100,000 attendees nationwide. This year we will present an exciting program that will shine a light on the largest human rights issues of our lifetime, including:

WHAT'S NEXT? - INDIGENOUS AFFAIRS AND RACIAL DISCRIMINATION IN AUSTRALIA

The Indigenous population in Australia has long fought for their rights. The festival has created a platform to showcase these important issues. HRAFF will proudly present What's Next?, featuring powerful films such as our spectacular Opening Night After the Apology, the Song Keepers, a forum talk and an art installation Baga-K Gaabi Brunga Biik, which will promote visibility, tolerance, and the inclusion of Indigenous citizens by showcasing their incredible contributions to our society.

AN EQUAL PLATFORM - GENDER EQUALITY

Gender equality is an issue essential for the achievement of human rights for all. Research shows that global efforts to close the gender gaps in pay and labour force participation have slowed so dramatically over the past year that full economic equality may not be reached for another 170 years. In 2018 HRAFF will proudly present *An Equal Platform:* an entire strand dedicated to the promotion of gender equality including screenings of *Her Sound Her Story, A Better Man* and a forum talk on Women's & Girl's rights titled *Where To From #MeToo?*

BORDERLINE - CONFLICT & THE GLOBAL MOVEMENT OF PEOPLE

In the last few years the world has witnessed a record number of people seeking protection from persecution, conflict and human rights violations. The largest at any time since World War II. By the end of 2015, more than 65 million people had fled their homes – or one in every 113 people in the world. We will proudly present Borderline – a series of films and forums, including our Centrepiece Gala Border Politics, Closing Night feature Last Men in Aleppo and the premiere of Elyas Alvis blistering play Daydreamer Wolf.

PUNISHMENT AND REDEMPTION - JUSTICE

As prisoners are deprived of their liberty, they are particularly vulnerable to human rights violations In 2018, HRAFF will be screening critically acclaimed *Land of the Free* and the new Australian film *Guilty*, which explores the execution of member of the Bali 9. Myuran Sukumaran.

OUR COMMON PLACE - THE ENVIRONMENT

All human beings depend on the environment. A safe, clean, healthy and sustainable environment is central to the full enjoyment of a wide range of human rights. In 2018, HRAFF will proudly present *Our Common Place:* A collection of events including screenings of *Silas, Piripkura* and *Food Fighter,* and the staging of the performance *Caliban* which all explore the intersection of human rights and the environment

YOUTH AND CHILDREN - CINESEEDS

CineSeeds is the youth component of the HRAFF program. A highlight is the one day summit – attracting over 350 children to explore and advance human rights through arts and film.

OUTER CITY - HRAFF GOES WEST

In partnership with the Footscray Community Arts Centre, The Sun Theatre, Multicultural Arts Victoria, Lush and Maribyrnong City Council, HRAFF will host a series of events across the festival, composed of a free screening of *The Song Keepers*, a community arts project, forums and workshops.

In 2008, Prime Minister Kevin Rudd said sorry to the Stolen Generations of Indigenous people taken from their kin and country since the 1800s. Since the apology the number of Indigenous children forcibly removed from their families has almost doubled. Through the story of four grandmothers brought together as unlikely activists in a battle

they thought was long over, director Larissa Behrendt chronicles the rise of a new national movement fighting to convince the government that sorry means you don't do it again. Bursting with the hopeful and resilient spirit of its remarkable subjects, *After the Apology* is a redemptive experience not to be missed.

After five years of war in Syria, the remaining citizens of Aleppo are getting ready for a siege. Through the volunteers from the White Helmets we experience the daily life, death and struggle in the streets, where they are fighting for sanity in a city where war has become the norm. Khalid, Subhi and Mahmoud are among the first to enter the destroyed buildings, scouring through the rubble in search of bodies and signs of life. They are now living more or less under constant bombing together with the remaining 350,000 civilians in Aleppo. They all struggle with the same dilemma: should they flee and bring their families to safety, or should they stay and fight for their city?



LEITIS IN WAITING

Leitis in Waiting is the story of Joey Mataele and the Tonga Leitis, an intrepid group of Indigenous transgender women fighting a rising tide of religious fundamentalism in their South Pacific Kingdom. With unexpected humour and extraordinary access to the royal family, the film follows Joey as she organises an exuberant beauty pageant, presided over by a princess, shelters a young contestant rejected by her family, and spars with evangelicals threatening to resurrect British colonial laws that would criminalise the Leitis' lives. This is an inside story, created by a transgender Polynesian woman who once competed in Joey's beauty pageant.

Border Politics follows human rights barrister Julian Burnside as he traverses the globe examining the harsh treatment of refugees metered out by most Western democracies.

Seventy years after the world constructed international conventions to ensure the horrors of World War II wouldn't be repeated, Burnside finds it terrifying to see both Australian and other western political leaders exploiting fears around border protection to extend political power. He questions whether the West has lost its moral compass, adopting ideas that reject humanity and undermine democracy. He concludes, this erosion of human rights poses a threat to the very democratic values that define Western society.

Focusing on characters rather than analysis, McCabe is able to capture both sides of the war and their reasoning behind it. Filmmaker, Camilla Magid has followed their lives for over two years and the film shows with precision the psychological impact of a prison system that focuses on punishment rather than prevention and rehabilitation. This award-winning modern-day ethnographic documentary takes its audience on the search for Pakyî and Tamandua, two remaining nomadic Indians of the Piripkura people who survive surrounded by farms and loggers encroaching on a protected area in the middle of the Amazon Forest. Jair Candor, a National Indian Foundation (FUNAI) public servant has been following the two since 1989 in a mission to keep record of their existence so the land may retain its protected status. Helmed in the spirit of conservation, this documentary highlights the fraught nature of defending Indigenous territory from the interests of big business.

THE BATTLE OF ALGIERS

GILLO PONTECORVO

Italy / 1966 / 121 mins / Italian with English subtitles / Narrative

Shot with an extraordinary documentary-like immediacy, Pontecorvo's seismic tract retains all of its shocking power and political relevance more than 50 years after its initial release. In its depiction of the popular Algerian uprising against French colonising forces, it fuses neo-realism with galvanising revolutionary agit-prop via stunning handheld camerawork, meticulous staging of chaos, utterly convincing deployment of non-actors and Ennio Morricone's dizzyingly propulsive score. Few films have had such a pervasive and catalysing influence on dissident world cinema, or indeed on freedom fighting movements themselves.



SOLEIL O

MED HONDO

France / 1970 / 98 mins / Italian with English subtitles / Narrative

One of the foundational figures of African cinema, Hondo's recently rediscovered debut feature is a fierce indictment of French imperialism and a lyrical and deeply expressionistic account of the exploitation of African migrant labour in postcolonial Paris. Whilst not explicitly autobiographical, the film draws deeply upon Hondo's personal experiences as a Mauritanian migrant living and working, both as a labourer and selfsupporting artist in 1960s Paris. Shot in a piecemeal fashion over four years, and fully self-funded, this seminal film is "suffused with a political indignation that, despite the film's historical specificity, still feels urgent today" (Dan Sullivan).






